County junior league cross country approaches 600

"Did you double tie your shoes? Follow the rabbit. You're doing great! Watch the mud! Go, go, go!" are all statements that can be heard on the trails of the junior league cross country course in Crossville.

The birth of the junior league cross country program began in 2007 with a maximum number of seventy runners and three elementary schools. It was born from a dream of Coach Pat and Damon Koehl and

Laura and Coach Louie DeLorenzo to bring running to every school in the county thus developing a feeder program for both Cumberland County High School and Stone Memorial High School, according

to Pat Koehl, Pleasant Hill teacher and CCHS cross country coach.

The original name of the league was CCHS Jr. League and was later changed to Cumberland County Junior League after

more elementary schools joined the program. The first year's season was run in the fall of the year but later changed to the spring because of the interference with the high school cross country schedule.

"By running in the springtime, we were able to avoid most sports programs already ongoing. More athletes were able to participate when they did not have

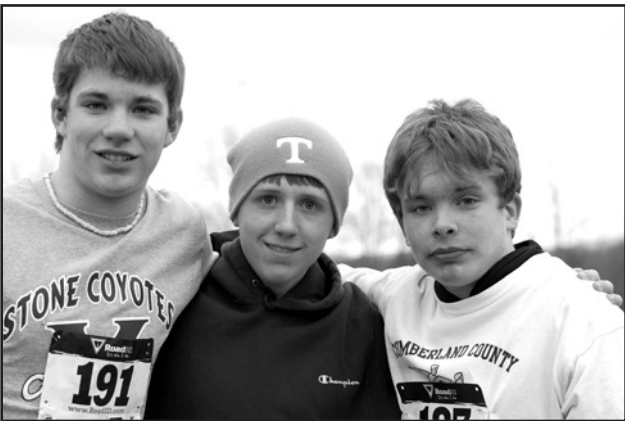

to make a choice of their sport,” said CCHS Coach Pat Koehl.

Today we have 567 participants in nine elementary schools, Crossville Christian School, and home school athletes. Coaches are in place at all of the schools with most of the schools having assistants.

First Baptist Church of Crossville provided the scene for a one and two mile trail-course laid out by Damon Koehl who also does the timing and set up with Vicki and Frank Mackzum.

“The Mackzums are a team that graciously gives time to our program. They travel across the Unit-

ed States doing timing for major cycling events. The Cumberland County Rescue Squad offers valuable volunteer assistance with traffic, emergency, and runner support during the races,” added Koehl.

“Without the efforts of everyone involved, this program would never have gotten off the ground and been as successful as it is today,” she concluded.

The first two meets were held Feb. 25 and March 18, with three meets remaining — April 1, April 8 and April 15.

CCHS track teams have high hopes for the 2011 season

When the CCHS track and field team opened its 2011 season at Kenwood High School on March 19, Coach Ted McCaslin has high expectations for his team, as he returns 22 lettermen — 11 boys and 11 girls — from last year.

"We lost five runners off last year's (girls team). We are dominated by juniors and have one senior this year," said McCaslin. "We have 14 to 15 new girls this year, eight new freshmen, two sophomores and four juniors. The squad should have around 27 athletes."

"We should be very competitive at every meet we go to. I look for this team to dominate in the 400-, 800-, 1600- and 3200-open races and be very strong in the 4x400 and 4x800 relays. We will be in the 100 and 200 races, as well as the 4x100 and 4x200 relays."

"However, I expect us to be better exponentially in these races," he continued.

"In the field events, we expect to be much better in the shot put and discus. As far as they long jump and triple jump, I feel as though we will qualify for the state meet in both events."

"While I was happy to get to the state meet in the 4x800 last year, I was unhappy we did not get one of the top eight. I expect that to be different this year. I do expect to get to the state meet in the 4x400 as well."

"As far as open races, I think we can qualify in the 400, 800 and 1600 open races. I do feel that within two years we'll have a girl on this team who can be a state champion," McCaslin said.

McCaslin expects some "noise in our sectional and at the state meet" from the following young ladies — juniors Maggie Bernabei, Kayla Sherrill, Brandi Green, Dimi Iles, Olivia McCoy, Jaclyn Reagan and Tori Noel and senior Victoria Ports.

Freshmen runners are Caroline Cravens, Ashley Davis, Brooke Golden, Jennifer Hedgecoth, Caroline Pribanich, Meghan Server,

Macy Sherey and Brianna Taylor.

New juniors joining the team are Samara Ham, Roni Harris, Autumn Segers and Lauren Sliger.

Green, Reagan, Ashley, Golden, Hedgecoth and Server will join the track team from the basketball team, while Green, Ports, Cravens, Iles, McCoy and Bernabei all ran on the cross country team in the fall.

Several of these young ladies did well at the Class AAA sub-sectional last spring — Reagan, seventh, in the 400 meter dash; Ports, seventh in the 800 meter run; Bernabei, ninth in the 800 meter run; Dyer, eighth in the 1600 meter run; Kelsey Scarbrough, 15th in the 1600 meter run; Iles, seventh in the 100 meter hurdles; Noel, sixth in the long jump and third in the triple jump; and Moore, 21st in both the shot put and discus.

The 4x100 relay team finished ninth, while the 4x400 was sixth and the 4x800 was fourth.

The Jets return 11 lettermen from last year's team, which lost four of five runners, who made the team good last year.

"We have 10 new athletes on this year's team and most of them are football or basketball players. Some come from the fall's cross country team. We should be tough in the long jump and triple jump this year, and be remarkably better in the shot put and discus events," he stated.

"As far as running, we well be strongest in the 400, 800, 1600 and 3200 open races. Our relay teams (4x400 and 4x800) may struggle this year; however, the 4x100 and 4x200 teams will be much better. We should be very tough in the 100 and 200 with the addition of some football athletes."

Returnees expected to make "some noise" are seniors Cory King, Matt Pennycuff, and Kyle Pritchard; and junior Tyler Wallace. Newcomers who are expected to be very

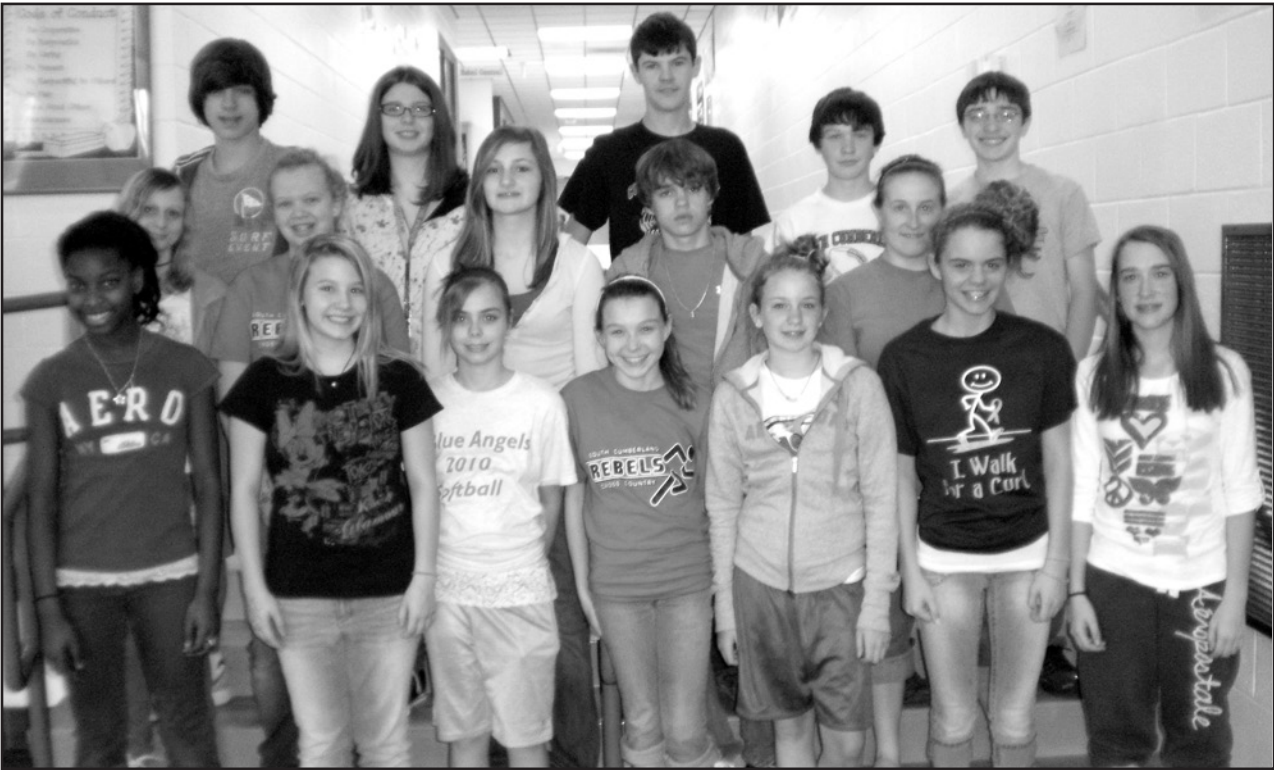

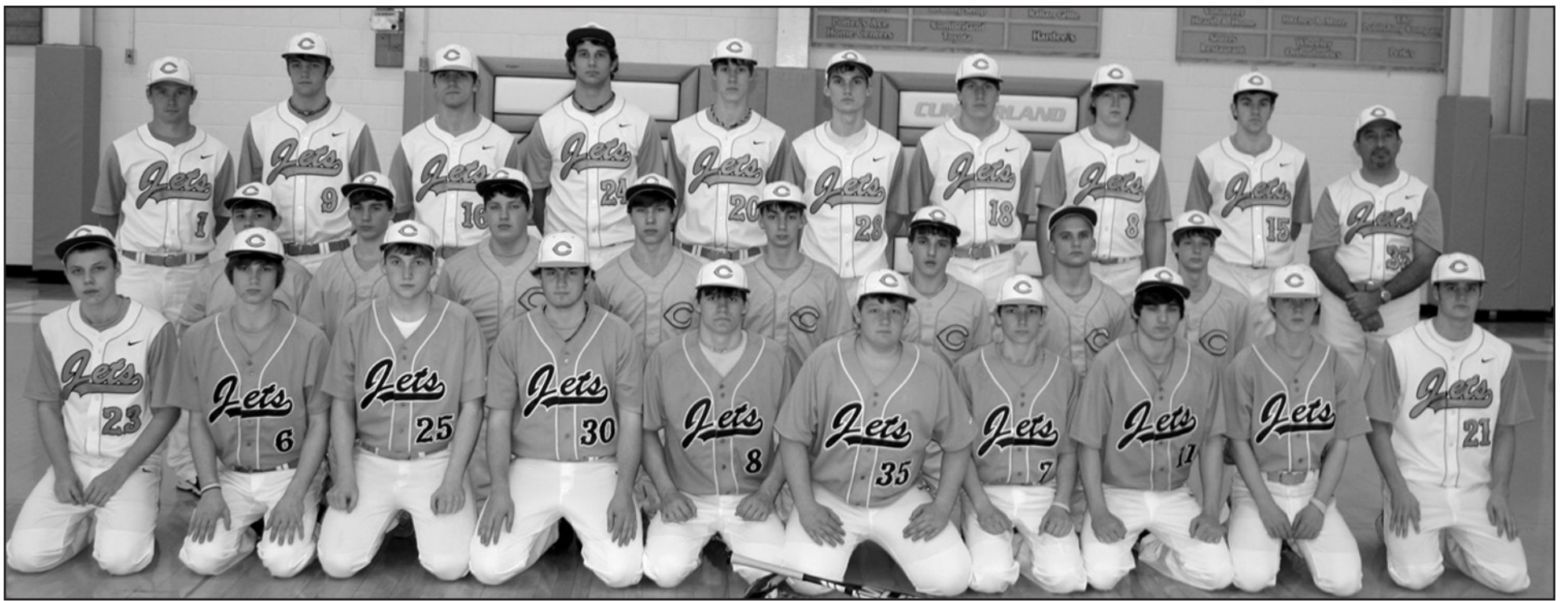

The 2011 Cumberland County Jet baseball squad looks to build upon last season's 15-win squad which was one win away from the school's second ever regional tournament berth and better than the third-place finish both the coaches and media picked them to finish third at the District 6AAA media day at Cumberland Mountain State Park in February.

The 2011 team returns nine lettermen from 2010 and six starters.

"This 2011 squad returns a strong core from our successful 2010 campaign but has some large holes to fill. How well we fill those holes with our returning guys and how many young kids can step up and help us develop some depth will determine how successful we can be this season," said Coach Dave Prichard.

Behind the plate, the Jets return three-year starter Derrek Hankins who again looks to be a solid defensive anchor for the Jets while building upon

his successful 2010 offensive campaign where he hit .315.

Behind Hankins, senior Troy Stickler and sophomores Dylan Fehr and Bobby Uebelacker could all see time at the catcher position.

The 2011 pitching staff looks to be one of the strong points for this Jets squad. It returns 12 of the 15 wins from last season and a vast majority of the innings pitched.

Heading up the rotation will be returning juniors Cole VanHorn and John Bilbrey. VanHorn and Bilbrey both posted 5-2 records in 2011 and combined for 128 strikeouts.

The duo were named Co-Pitchers of the Year and were both named All-District.

Rounding out the rotation will be senior Bo Davis, and sophomores David Stallworth and Aaron Jones.

Davis will see opportunities as both a starter and a reliever while both Stall-

worth and Jones have had a good off-season and look to contribute as starters.

Stickler, sophomore Tayler Houston, and freshman Reed Shaw could all see time on the mound.

Houston was the Jets' Freshman of the Year in 2010, while Davis was also named All-District.

The infield is the biggest question mark for this year's Jets with big holes to fill at both first base and shortstop, as veteran starters Matt Jones and Bryan Woodlief both graduated. Senior Josh Sanders will make the move from the outfield to first base due to outfield depth.

Sophomore Cameron O'Rourke could also see time at first base.

Middle infield play must be strong for the Jets to be successful and will be anchored down by junior Zac Kerley and Houston. Both could see time at shortstop and second base.

Third base will be played by Cole VanHorn who returns from a very

successful 2010 campaign.

Both sophomore Andrew Daugherty and junior utility player Donovan O'Rourke could see time in the infield as well.

The Jets outfield should be the strong point for the squad both defensively and offensively.

Bilbrey will anchor centerfield and will be expected to lead the team offensively as well. He looks to build upon a 2010 campaign that saw him hit .411 with 31 RBI.

Davis will also carry a

heavy load as he returns from a .356 and 16 RBI 2010.

Stickler and Stallworth will round out the third outfield spot.

Both look to have a breakout season.

Freshmen A.J. Dick and Matt Ledbetter could possibly see some time in the outfield or use as utility players.

"We look to be a very competitive ballclub this spring. We have several questions that must be answered as do many of the

teams in our district. How quickly those are answered will determine our level of success. We must play strong defense and pitch well.

"Consistency will be the key for us on offense. I like the makeup of our core group but we have to have some young guys step up. You can't win our district or move on into the playoffs without some depth," concluded Prichard, whose team is off to a 6-3 overall start and 2-2 in the district.

The Cumberland County High School Jet baseball team was picked to finish third in District 6AAA by both the media and coaches at their media day on Feb. 8, at the Cumberland Mountain State Park Restaurant.

Both polls — the coaches and the media — were identical. Coffee County was first, followed by Cookeville, CCHS, White County and Warren County, after the schools' head coaches made the presentation to the media representing the five schools.

In fact, the order of the presentations by the coaches turned out to be the order of the two polls.

First to speak was Coffee County Coach Chase Jones, who has a 10-year record of 190-149, including a 27-17 overall and 6-2 district mark in 2010. His Red Raiders finished second during the regular season and captured the league tournament.

He and assistant coach Josh Morris return nine lettermen, including four starters.

"The biggest question mark will be who is on the mound behind Collin Baldwin and Brandon Nester," said Jones. "We will be in an experimental stage. We will have first-year starters on Mondays and Tuesdays."

Key players returning including catcher Heath Sain; pitcher/first baseman Collin Baldwin; pitcher Brandon Nester; shortstop Jacob Lund; center fielder Ethan Myers and first baseman/designated hitter Reed Wolfe.

Cookeville Coach Butch Chaffin, who has a 16-year record of 251-128, is assist-

ed by Greg Tubbs, Jerry Hamm, Tyler Reeder and Derek Allen.

Cookeville was 23-16 and 9-2 in the district, finishing as regular season champions and tournament runners-up.

He has nine lettermen and four starters including, third baseman Colby Harmon, center fielder Darien Tubbs, catcher/pitcher Jared Davis, first baseman/pitcher Ethan Davis and second baseman/pitcher Will Campbell.

"I was not in love with the coaches in District 7AAA. I love these guys. It is not a hate-hate thing," Chaffin added. "I love the chemistry of this team. I feel good about our hitting. Defensively, we will be average."

CCHS Coach Dave Prichard has posted a four-year record of 70-127, including 15-17 and 4-4 for third place in the district. They were 1-2 in the district tournament.

Besides the team of captains, the Jets look to soar into a strong season with the leadership and "power house" contributions from their forwards — Jacob Valentin, and Jarrod Lee, and midfielders — Keith Fagan,

Amsony Gayton, Herschel Murner, Oscar Barillas and the newly positioned Tyler Bennett.

"To witness these boys who have set the example of being dedicated to complete the job/goal at hand to have a winning season is inspirational," says Marshall.

The Jets will also be relying heavily this season on their defense to help accomplish their goals. The defensive skills lead by senior captains Jonathan Vallecillo and Koby Wilson are supported by junior McKenzie Childress and sophomore Drew Talford, who look to ease the burden from goalies Gonzalez and sophomore Brandon Brown.
