'Glad' to be back

TC St. Francis eager to make up for past blowouts

TRAVERSE CITY - From dancin' in the Dome to down in the dumps, all in less than a calendar year.

For most of the seniors on the Traverse City St. Francis football team, their prep careers began with an exciting playoff run that culminated in a Division VII state championship in Pontiac. Few saw actual game action as freshmen, but the experience left a definite impression.

Considering the past Gladiators' gridiron exploits, one of those freshman — Pat Heintz, now a senior halfback/defensive back — figured that playoff success would be an annual rite.

"It was great," Heintz recalled. "We got to practice with the varsity and dress for the games. And we definitely learned a lot — just the intensity, and what it takes to make a (playoff) run."

But such gluttonous achievement proved difficult, and the

Gladiators struggled to 5-4 records in both 2000 and 2001, making the postseason field each year on playoff points rather than the compulsory six wins.

And after losing a grip on the Lake Michigan crown in 2000 after claiming or sharing it in each previous campaign since the league congealed in 1990, the team's first postseacontest that season son proved far worse than disastrous. Northwest Conference champion Kingsley saddled St. Francis with a 56-13 pasting that ranks as the Glads' worst playoff setback in histo-

"That was certainly a bad way to end the season to say the least." TCSF coach Larry Sellers said. "But considering the fact that we had ... a lot of players back from that state championship team, it was especially disappointing. We had tremendous leadership in 1999, but that wasn't necessarilv the case in 2000."

'At Kingsley, a lot of us were sophomores, so there really wasn't too much we could do to try and get back in the game," said Mike Schram, now a senior lineman and, along with Heintz, one of four cocaptains. "Looking at that scoreboard — that was pretty hard. We had just come off of winning states."

The 2001 season wasn't much better. Another 5-4 record, no Lake Michigan title, and another back-door playoff bid resulted in a similar first-this time a 37-0 shellacking at

the hands of Glen Lake. It was the first time in six years that a Gladiators team had been blanked, and the first time ever that St. Francis had been bounced in the first round of the playoffs in two consecutive seasons.
