"Anything and everything we do here is to preserve and remember how things were in the '30s," said park manager Jim Smith. "We provide a learning experience for youngsters and oldsters alike."

The park is open for wagon rides and demonstrations from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. every Friday, Saturday and Sunday during the summer and fall. Visitors can walk the nature trails, explore historical buildings, watch old farm machines in action and even pet some of the many animals that live there, including sheep, goats, llamas and peacocks. There is also a farm market during the week in season.

Along with the usual activities, Wellington Farm Park has several special events and festivals scheduled for the fall.

Wellington Farm Park's Pumpkinfest takes place every weekend during the month of October. This festival features free hayrides,

an operating cider mill and different themes each week. From "Everything Apples" weekend to "Cider, Molasses & Vinegar" weekend, visitors can learn how to make breads, soups, spreads and desserts the

old-fashioned way.

Sept. 27 and 28 is the park's "Walk-thru-History." With interactive displays, demonstrations and music, visitors literally walk through history from 1600 to 1932.

Wellington Farm Park is a non-profit organization in its eighth year of operation. It relies on 60 volunteers who work hard to make demonstrations both interesting and accurate, said Smith.

"We've got a fantastic group of supporters," he said. "Our primary focus is education."

Now they just need to spread the word.

"Our biggest problem is just trying to get the word out," Smith said. "People have said we're the best kept secret in Crawford County."
