# Bay Side entertainment's cool music lineup

nce again, the shores of Grand Traverse Bay is the place to look for family entertainment during the National Cherry Festival.

Mike Jones worked with Meridian Entertainment Group to book the bands that will grace the Pepsi – Kentucky Fried Chicken Bay Side Stage this year. He said his goal in arranging the shows was to offer a variety of music, something different every day. The entire week is presented by Blue Cross/Blue Shield/Blue Care Network of Michigan, Charter Digital Cable and TV 7&4.

"We're not looking necessari- and loads of ly to appeal to different demographics, just for different styles of music," he said. "We need to mix it up a bit." Jones offered Wednesday's entertainment, 1964 The Tribute, as an example of what the organizers looked for in a band.

"You see kids who know every word, and grandmas who know every word they're all excited to be there," he said. "That's what we're trying to do every night."

The National Cherry Festival will kick off an eight-day entertainment schedule with Loverboy taking the stage on Saturday, July 5 presented by Labatt Blue, in cooperation with WKLT.

Loverboy was one of the most popular rock bands in America and on MTV during the 1980's, and count four multi-platinum albums and numerous international gold albums to their name. Their hit singles went on to become the anthems and party songs of an entire generation of rock concert going fans. Loverboy's red leather pants, bandannas and big rock sound defined the band's image and live show. Loverboy will entertain Festival-goers with hit singles like "Working For The Weekend," "Take Me To The Top," "Only The Lucky Ones," and "Jump," all notably from the multi-platinum selling album "Get Lucky".

Shelton, a country music singer/songwriter, moved to Nashville only two weeks out of high school five years ago and began to carve out a place in country music. Shelton's single "The Baby" recently went to #1 on Billboard's Country Singles Chart, and staved there for three weeks. in addition to being #1 on the rock and roll chart.
