Thether it's a simple Tshirt or cherry garb you seek, the National Cherry Festival Souvenir Pavilion is the place to be.

"Everything is very cherry in our tent," said Mark Jensen, owner of JenTees in Traverse City.

Jensen has been the official souvenir vendor of the National Cherry Festival for eight years.

Tourists and natives to Traverse City can poke around and browse the pavilion from 10 a.m. until 11 p.m. every day of the Festival.

Jensen said prices range from about \$1.50 for a keychain to \$60 for the special commemorative afghan, and all taxes are included.

"We've got very familyfriendly prices," he said.

Out of towners can even have their souvenirs shipped home, Jensen said. The United States **Postal Service Shipping** Center will be located at the Farm Market tent at the Open Space.
