"off the beaten path" location could be beneficial.

Craft said she opened the North Star Gallery, located on Eighth Street near Garfield, in a more remote location because "the area needs to be built up." Besides, she added, "It was cheaper than going on Front Street."

The North Star is unlike some other galleries because Craft rents space to local artists and vendors but takes no commission.

Because of this differ-

ence, Craft feels that the North Star avoids competition with other galleries.

"We're not a really ritzy gallery. It's a place where you can always get a gift," she said.

Cost is definitely a consideration when choosing a location. Algueseva said that people who visit River Street Gallery have asked why, since they deal with national and international artists as well as some from Michigan, the gallery doesn't move to a city like Chicago where the demand is higher.

"You may be able to triple your prices, but your

rent is quadrupled and your cost of living is multiplied as well," he said.

Algueseva is not alone in his sentiments. Therefore, many area artists have put their faith in the local scene, hoping that the presence of a handful of galleries will attract more visitors, making it easier and more profitable for everyone.

As Oberschulte said, "Local galleries would do all right if there were more. It's hard when you're standing alone. And it's not a huge moneymaker — you have to do it because you love it."
