DIA goes on the road with Baroque exhibit

Dennos Museum features 'Golden Age' collection

TRAVERSE CITY — Detroit's loss is Traverse City's gain.

But officials at the Dennos Museum Center are betting that an exhibition of Baroque paintings on loan from the Detroit Institute of Arts will attract visitors not just from the Cherry Capital but from all over northern Michigan.

"Pursuits and Pleasures: Baroque Paintings from the Detroit Institute of Arts" is on display June 28-Sept. 14 at the Dennos, on the Northwestern Michigan College campus. The collection of 35 works from the so-called "Golden Age" of European painting is the largest loan of European Old Master paintings to travel the

state from the collections of the DIA, said Eugene Jenneman, Dennos Museum Center director.

The exhibition of Dutch, Flemish, French, Italian and British paintings will give modern viewers a rare glimpse into 17th and 18th century Europe, when appreciation for the fine arts was more widespread than it had been since classical Greece and Rome. It includes portraits, landscapes, architectural views and images of daily life by such artists as Giovanni Paolo Panini, Jacob van Ruisdael, Frans Snyders, Claude Gellée, Giovanni Tiepolo and Thomas Gainsborough.

Calling themselves the Michigan Old Masters Consortium, the Dennos and three other Michigan museums helped plan and implement the exhibition, and each will host it for up to four months. The loan was made possible by a renovation and expansion project at the Detroit art museum that forced the closing of several galleries and limited storage space.

Admission to the exhibition is \$4 for adults and \$2 for children. Support was provided by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Michigan
