MOVE OVER, NAPA VALLEY

Region's wineries have become ambassadors for the region

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In the past few years, the vineyards in northern Michigan, particularly those in Grand Traverse and Leelanau counties, have deservedly earned a growing reputation as being producers of world-class wine.

Wine aficionados, connoisseurs and vintners worldwide are taking note of the Riesling, Chardonnay, Pinot Noir, Cab Franc, Pinot Grigio and other wines that have been winning awards in regional and international competitions.

Dan Berger, a syndicated wine columnist and a recognized wine authority, recently visited the Leelanau Peninsula, which is home to 10 different wineries that, together, make up the Leelanau Peninsula Vintners

Association (LPVA). After experiencing what they offered, he said he felt he had stumbled upon one of the best-kept secrets in the wine industry.

"They are certainly producing wines of distinction and quality," said Berger. "Leelanau Peninsula winemakers are definitely showing an aggressive and courageous approach to winemaking technique, and that is reflected in the bottle."

In addition to the 10 wineries in Leelanau County, four others operate on Old Mission Peninsula. Those four organized in 2002 as a Wine Trail entitled Wineries of Old Mission cultural conditions, and the Peninsula (WOMP). Their motto is "Four unique wineries, one destination. "

Liz Berger of Chateau Chantal, a winery and B & B that is celebrating its 10th

anniversary, said that organizing under this banner has advantages for both the public and the vintner.

"It ultimately makes it easier for the consumer to think of the region as a wine trail. rather than one individual winery. It's just another tool to navigate the area."

Michigan has 13,500 acres of vineyards, making the state the fourth largest for grape growing, but what makes Leelanau and Grand Traverse unique in this equation is the microclimate here, combined with being located on the 45th Parallel. The region has long been hailed for its excellent agrilatest tradition has become the grape harvest.

There are several ways to enjoy local wines. The first is to visit the wineries themselves and taste their prod-

ucts. Whether you visit one tasting room or stretch it into a day-long tour, sampling, buying and traveling is the way to learn the most about individual wineries and their products. Most also have Web sites, which allow for virtual touring.

The wines can also be found in area wine shops, gourmet delis and grocery stores, and nearly every restaurant in the region that serves wine has a section dedicated to those made locally that are available

either by the glass or bottle. Ask the wineries about or check out information on Web sites regarding special promotions, events and packages. From wine weekends to events such as the Harvest Stompede in the fall, there are ways to transform the appreciation of wine into a memorable activity.

"We are clearly an industry on the rise," says Rick Coates of the LPVA. "We're more than makers of quality wines; we're also ambassadors to the tourism industry."
