The Grand Traverse Baykeeper:

■ Is the eyes, ears and voice for Grand Traverse Bay and its watershed.

Serves as an advocate for pollution prevention throughout the watershed.

■ Increases communication and networking among users of the Bay.

■ Pursues action to stop identified water pollution.

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Works with individuals and organizations to strengthen public stewardship of the Bay.

■ Responds to shoreline landowner's requests for assistance to identify water quality problems.

Responds to citizen complaints about pollution incidents and requests for natural resources protection, including protection of endangered species.

■ Actively monitors the health of the Bay by land, by boat and with the help of volunteers.
