This will mark the TSO's seat outdoor venue and its first collaboration with Severinsen, best known as the Grammy-award winning leader of "The Tonight Show Band" in the days of Johnny Carson.

Next for TSO will be Symphonic Concert I at 8 p.m. on Sept. 25 and 3 p.m. on Sept. 26 at Corson Auditorium at Interlochen showcasing Yugoslovianborn violinist Walter Verdehr in an all-Beethoven program of his Egmont Overture, Violin Concerto and Symphony No. 5 pieces.

Old Town Playhouse will open its "A Tony Award Winning Season" with a highly regarded, though controversial Stephen Sondheim musical entitled "Assassins." This darkly funny musical is based on nine different people from various eras of history who achieved notoriety for trying to assassinate American presidents.
