Northern Lower Michigan's beautiful landscapes make it a perfect place for artists who find inspiration in the outdoors

A group of painters from the Artcenter in Traverse City are among those who gather each week at scenic sites — from farms to galleries in neighboring towns to paint.

The practice of painting outside, on location is called plein air painting. For those who do it, there's nothing more satisfying.

"All winter we have to work inside," said Catherine Cron, a plein air group member who has been painting for more than That's why a lot of us use 60 years. "It's so nice to get back outside and work from nature. There's more inspiration, watching something that's actually alive and moving. Like the leaves here are moving and the blossoms are speaking to you and you can hear the wind and feel the sun and then put that all in the painting.'

The plein air group was formed by Artcenter member Mary Ellen Thero and friend Ruth Braun five years ago.

"We met in a class and we used to go out together, just the two of us," Thero said. "Then we thought.

"It's just a very relaxed organization," Thero said. "You come when you want to. And there's no cost involved and there's no instruction. Anyone's welcome to come who likes to paint on location."

Group members can choose their forms of expression, but must be quick to catch the everchanging landscape, Thero said.

"It's a whole different idea," she said. "You have this whole landscape to consider so you really have to narrow things down. You have to be very quick. watercolor or pastels — to catch shadows and different circumstances of weath-

Group member Lynne Hertler has been plein air painting for a year and finds having a whole landscape a benefit instead of a challenge.

"You don't have to think about what your background is going to be," she said. "You don't have to create something. You always have a background.' The group is made up of mostly amateur artists, but some members have had pieces on display.


