Developer's plan denied

PETOSKEY-Planning officials in Bear Creek Township again denied a developer's plea for zoning changes that would allow for a "big box" retail development to be built just south of Petoskey.

Bear Creek planning commissioners this week voted against petitions for zoning changes that would bring a planned unit development containing 175,000 square feet of commercial space and more than 200 residential units to a 70-acre parcel of land at Intertown and Anderson Roads near the Petoskey Wal-Mart store.

It was the second time township planners denied rezoning petitions from Kevin McGraw and the East Lansing-based Petoskey Investment Group.

Teens pulled from wreck

FIFE LAKE — Two Lewiston teens were hospitalized Friday after they were pulled from a burning car on U.S. 131 near M-186.

Police say the 16-year-old driver and 19-year-old passenger were passing another vehicle northbound when they lost control and sideswiped the vehicle. Their car ran off the road, hit a tree and burst into flames.

The teens were taken to Munson Medical Center where they were listed in serious condition, police said. No one in the second vehicle was injured.

Officials can't sign checks TRAVERSE CITY — The financially troubled city Housing Commission's top two

officials are barred from signing payroll and other checks because the commission's insurance agent refused to bond them.

Both commission Chairman Joseph Kau-be-naw and vicechair Christine Blackledge haven't signed commission checks since late last year. Kau-be-naw was excluded

because of past credit questions, while Blackledge declined to fill out the bonding company's financial questionnaire, according to commission records.

Several past financial and personnel practices at the commission have been challenged by HUD officials after the housing agency's accountant raised questions last year. Those questions led to the firing of former executive director Lorri Burtt.

New housing director Karl Fulmer and Commissioner Frances DuBois currently are signing the agency's checks.

Agency objects to bridge

TRAVERSE CITY — At least one federal agency is opposing the Road Commission's Hartman-Hammond bridge project, saying there are alternatives to the county's plans with "significantly fewer" environmental impacts.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is urging the state **Department of Environmental** Quality to reject state wetland construction permits for the proposed bridge over the Boardman River in central Garfield Township.

The federal agency criticized the county's work on studying other design options for the bridge including a total span of the river to minimize wetland impacts in a four-page letter late last month to the DEQ.

The state is reviewing the county's construction plans for the bridge with a decision due in mid-October.

Woman sentenced to life

MANISTEE — Alicia Famiano, 24, was sentenced to life in prison for stabbing Dale Gannon, 47, more than 100 times with a pair of scissors in his Manistee apartment in February 2002 after the two met at a bar.

Famiano could be paroled after she pleaded guilty but mentally ill in June to seconddegree murder charges. She was competent to stand trial, based on a psychological eval-

uation.

Since her arrest, Famiano maintained she attacked Gannon to ward off a sexual assault.

Police, however, said they found no evidence of an assault or wounds to suggest self-defense.

Plan would raze building

CHARLEVOIX — A unique downtown building that once housed the offices of the late Earl Young — designer of the city's famous "mushroom houses" — would be razed under a developer's plan.

Area residents crowded into the city council's Monday meeting, both to express support for saving the Appletree building, and to express concern over Elk Rapids developer Jerry Rutter's plans for the site at 224 Bridge St.

Young, who died in 1975, grew up in Charlevoix. From the 1920s to his death, with no of Paris, Mich., who passed
