Rights board explored

TRAVERSE CITY — The new city commission may be trying to influence the scope of its human rights board and potentially scrap controversial stances such as opposition to the invasion of Iraq and the Patriot Act.

The groups met Dec. 8, the first joint session since voters ousted Human Rights Commission-friendly Mayor Margaret Dodd and commissioner Ann Rogers. Several city commissioners made it clear they don't want their agenda filled with out-oftown resolutions such as one focusing on the Patriot Act.

The city established the HRC in 1969 and the board has largely delved into local issues like landlord-tenant disputes and police misconduct cases. But it's also taken on hot political topics like the Patriot Act and sexual orientation issues — and put the city commission on the spot during some of the discussions.

Some HRC members noted what they considered tension and frustration from the city commission, but called it a frank and open discussion and said they look forward to better communication.

Mayoral changes for TC?

TRAVERSE CITY — A possible city charter amendment could be in the works that would require sitting commissioners to step down before they can run for mayor.

The commission is slated to discuss that issue, and extending the city's mayoral terms from two to four years, at a study session next month. Both changes would require voter approval, which could be added to the ballot during the 2004 election schedule.

City voters amended the charter in 2000 to elect the mayor to a two-year term by popular vote, but didn't place added restrictions on who could run for the position.

Sitting commissioners did enter the mayoral race in 2001 and again this year. Two years ago, mid-term commissioner Phill Orth ran unsuccessfully against Margaret Dodd, who became the city's first popularly-elected mayor in 60 years.

This year mid-term commissioner Linda Smyka challenged and defeated Dodd in the Nov. 4 election. Smyka's win left a vacancy for the remaining two years of her commission term, which was filled by appointment this month.

Strike would cut trips

TRAVERSE CITY —
Northern Michigan's two
commercial airports face
canceled flights and unhappy passengers if Mesaba
Airlines pilots go on strike
as planned Jan. 10.

Mesaba spokesman Dave Jackson said a pilots strike would ground four of seven flights daily between Cherry Capital Airport and Detroit that Mesaba operates for Northwest Airlink, as well as one daily flight between Traverse City and Minneapolis, Minn.

At Pellston Regional Airport, three of Northwest's four daily flights to and from Detroit are operated by Mesaba, and would be grounded, Jackson said.

Mesaba pilots, represented by the Air Line Pilots Association, are seeking a new contract. Union officials cite key unresolved issues including job security, compensation, retirement and work rules.

Jackson said negotiations will continue through next week.

He and the college signed an agreement on Dec. 22 that calls for NMC to pay his annual \$83,874 salary for nine months unless he finds other employment. If not, the college will pay him more than \$62,000, plus benefits.

The college announced Hornburg's departure Tuesday after allowing seven days for him to revoke the agreement, Nelson said.

The college had previously said Hornburg was placed on paid leave on Dec. 8 for unspecified reasons.

NMC President Tim Nelson would not say whether Hornburg was forced to leave, but he repeatedly referred to the "mutually agreed upon document" spelling out terms of his departure.
